YOUNG PEOPLE'S CHOIR We Shall Overcome

Believed to be taken from an older hymn written by Charles Albert Tindley, We Shall Overcome is believed to have been first sung at a worker's protest in 1945 in Charleston, SC.¹ Popularized during the struggle for Civil Rights in the 1960s, We Shall Overcome was sung by over 50,000 attendees at Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's funeral.² The version sung today was arranged and popularized by the American folk singer/songwriters Pete Seeger and Joan Baez.
